The Popular Casting Crowns song "Who Am I" says, "I am a flower quickly fading. Here today and gone tomorrow (Matthew 6:30), a wave tossed in the ocean (James 1:6), A vapor in the wind (James 4:14)."

The Bible speaks of life on this world being but an instant and in comparison, to eternity this life on this earth is but a flash of lightning. "You do not know what will happen tomorrow. For what is life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away" (James 4:14)

In the poem by Linda Ellis "The Dash" the poem points out that it's the dash in the middle that is the important part of life. Food Pantry

The dispersal for the month of January was light due to the Martin Luther King, Jr Holiday and the bad weather. 125 bags were given out to 74 families (313 people). There were 6 new families that applied for help. We also received approximately 50 lbs. of canned goods from the City of Lytle Christmas hay rides. Thank-you to all those who volunteer, pray or donate to this very important ministry!

Why Ash Wednesday?

(Taken from umc.org – Because that is who we used to be)

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent, a time when many Christians prepare for Easter. Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Ashes are an ancient symbol. In Genesis, we read that God formed human beings out of the dust of the earth (Genesis 2:7). After expulsion from the Garden of Eden, the first human beings are told by God, "you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19 NRSV). The Hebrew word translated dust, is occasionally translated "ashes" elsewhere. Throughout scripture, ashes are part of rituals when people seek forgiveness and mourn their sin (see Numbers 19:9, 17; Hebrews 9:13; Jonah 3:6; Matthew 11:21, and Luke 10:13, among others).

United Methodists first adopted an official ritual for Ash Wednesday that involves the use of ashes in the 1992 Book of Worship. Prior to that time, Methodists either had no official service at all for this day (through 1964) or an "ashless" Ash Wednesday Service (1965 Book of Worship).

As the ashes are placed on the forehead, words such as these are spoken:
"Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return," recalling God's words to Adam in Genesis 3:19, or "Repent, and believe the gospel" recalling the message of both John the Baptist and Jesus (Mark 1:15).
Through the service of ashes on the first day of Lent, we come before God recognizing our humanity, repenting of our sin, and remembering who we are

and who we can be.

"Our History

In 1990, a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat" was delivered to a small youth group at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC led by Brad Smith, who was serving as a seminary intern at the time.

This gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football, food and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation DIRECTLY to a local charity of THEIR choice.

The first year, they invited 22 area churches to join the team and collected \$5,700 with 100% of donations distributed to local-area charities.

That was 1990. Since then, Tackle Hunger, with its signature Souper Bowl of Caring event has become a national, grass-roots, youth-inspired movement where ordinary people are doing extraordinary good. Over \$193 MILLION in dollars and food has been generated while benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

Thousands of participants including: churches, schools, youth groups, community partners, grocery partners, local businesses, media partners, NFL teams and passionate individuals have experienced for themselves, the joy and satisfaction of giving, serving and inspiring people across the country to follow their generous example."
